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STAC's Coming to Clubs

Quicktricks, Sunset, and CABC will all participate in the Royal STAC running the week of December 4th. All points won in the Royal STAC will be 25% gold, 25% silver, 25% red, and 25% black. So, if you need some of those precious pigmented points, come out and show your skill. This is true in the limited games as well as the open ones. And all open games are stratified, so all you need to do is place in your strat. Come to the clubs, and get those points without having to travel to an NABC, regional, or sectional.

Since 1960, the Chinese American bridge club (CABC) has hosted weekly invitational games emphasizing mentorship and friendly competition. The CABC STAC game will be Monday Dec. 4 at 11:30. If you wish to play, find a member you know and ask to be invited as a guest.

The Quicktricks game will be that evening at 6:45. The Quicktricks game is the largest club game in San Francisco (and much of the Bay Area). It's a friendly group. They feature 0-10, 499er, and open games.

The Sunset Club will hold two STAC games, one on December 6 and the other December 8. Both games are at noon. There will be an open game and, if sufficient interest, a 499er game. The Sunset games are very friendly and relaxed.

Tis the Season

Quicktricks will hold it's annual Holiday Party on December 18. So after you fill up at the unit game on the 17th, don't eat anything else and come Monday and enjoy desserts, beverages, good bridge, and good cheer among friends at Quicktricks. As usual, Quicktricks will have a 499 pairs game, and a 0-10 pairs game. The open game on the 18th will be teams. Quicktricks will be closed December 25 and January 1, but open on Mondays throughout the new year (excluding holidays.)

The Sunset Club has a promotion throughout the remainder of the year. If you bring someone to a Friday game who has not played there in the past 3 months, you and that person will get to play free. So if you haven't played at Sunset recently, find a partner and claim that free play. If you have played there, find someone who hasn't and both of you play free. Such a deal! And this includes the Royal STAC.

The Sunset Club has Andy's world-famous tuna and other goodies at every game. You never know when a special dessert will show up as they have at two recent birthdays. Games are Wednesdays and Fridays at noon. The club will be closed from Christmas through New Years.

A Little Precaution by Robert Ng

Cover up the east-west hands in the diagram to the right. You arrive at $4 \pm$ after a Texas transfer auction. Plan the play.

If trumps come in for no loser, there are always 10 sure tricks. So, before going about drawing trumps, take a moment to see if there is anything that can be done should you find that a trump loser is unavoidable. If declarer tries a \clubsuit finesse first, even if it loses to the Q, there will be an established \clubsuit winner to take care of either dummy's \P or \blacklozenge loser. The problem, however, is that if the \clubsuit finesse fails, and a \blacklozenge is returned, the defender with a winning trump may be able to ruff in before the \blacklozenge loser can be discarded away on the winning \clubsuit .

The better line after winning the ♥ A at trick 1 is to immediately lead a low ♣ to the A in hand. Next comes three rounds of trumps. If trumps break nicely, declarer can try the ♣ finesse for a possible overtrick. Even if the finesse loses, the established 4th ♣ winner will take care of the ♦loser in dummy.

Should trumps spring a leak, declarer now leads the second ح from dummy to his K, and concedes a trick to the c Q, setting up the c 10. When the defense shifts to +, declarer wins the A, and pitches the losing + away on the established c 10, making a loser-on-loser play to hold his loss to a \forall , c Q and c J.

Note that if you have not taken the precaution to lead one round of \clubsuit to your Ace BE-FORE starting trumps, you cannot overcome this particular distribution of the cards. When you try to recover from the 4-1 trump break by cashing the two top \clubsuit to try to set up your \clubsuit winner, E meanly ruffs your second top \clubsuit . As the cards lie, E cannot gain by ruffing the second \clubsuit off the board, and you can then play \clubsuit K and another, setting up the 4th \clubsuit for the loser-on-loser play.
